What is the Entry/Exit System?



The Entry/Exit System Benefits

Digitalisation of borders

- Modernised external border management
- State-of-the-art system
- No passport stamping
- Automation of border crossings facilitating and enhancing traveller experience

Identification of over-stayers

- Reliable data on entries, exits, and refusals of entry.
- Systematically detecting travellers exceeding authorised stay duration

Combatting Identity Fraud

- Enhanced accuracy of identity verification thanks to biometric data collection

Reinforced Security

- Improved security checks at the borders due to electronic records on travellers
- High level of security within the Schengen area thanks to biometric data collection

Real-time information sharing

- Real-time sharing of crucial data about non-EU travellers enables authorities across the EU to access information timely

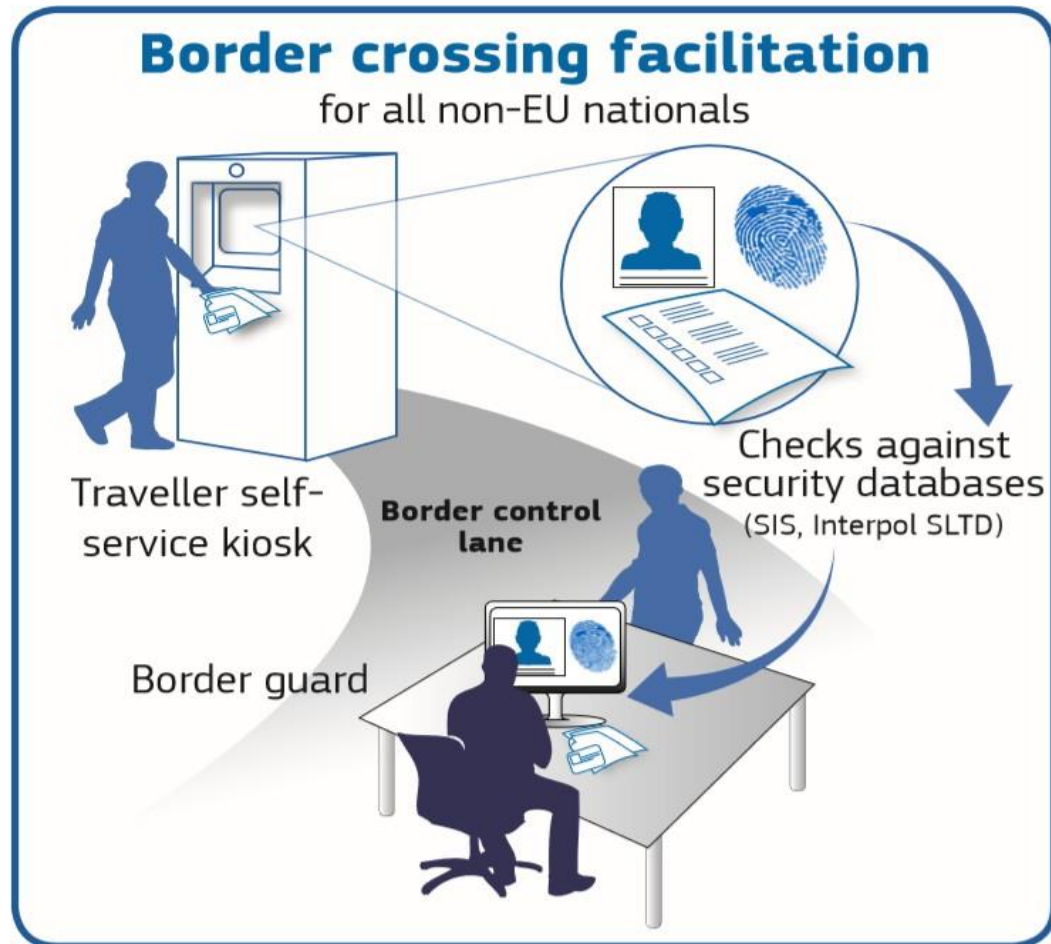
Who is concerned?

- All third-country nationals travelling for a short stay ("90/180 days" rule) to and from 29 countries using the system: both visa-exempt and visa-required travellers
- Refusals of entry will be also recorded

! Exceptions: Non-EU nationals who hold a residence card and are immediately related to an EU national, air crew members in performance of their duties (more exceptions [here](#))



How does EES work?



Before travelling:

If visa required – visa (VIS)

If visa exempt – travel authorisation (ETIAS)

At BCP:

Preregistration through (optional) mobile app

Biometrics at kiosk / booth

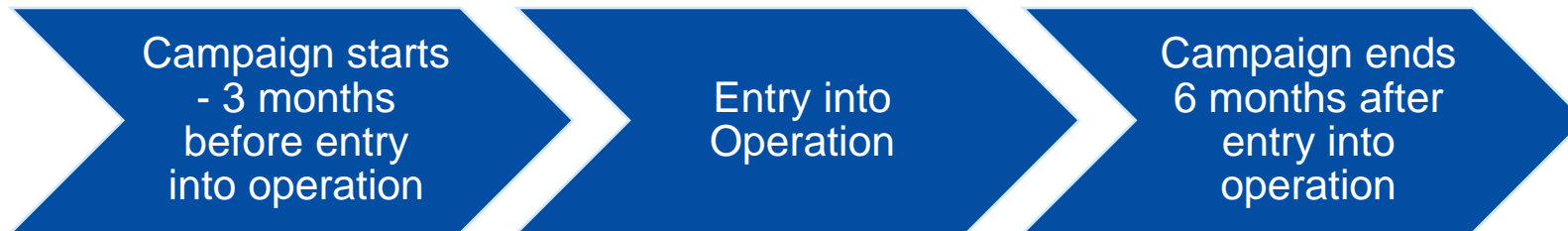
When will EES go live?

What is ETIAS?

ETIAS is an electronic travel authorisation for visa-exempt nationals travelling to the Schengen area and Cyprus for short stays.

Who does not need an ETIAS?

- UK nationals beneficiaries of the Withdrawal Agreement
- Recognised refugees residing in the EU
- Holders of residence permit/card issued
- Holders of a diplomatic passports
- Members of NATO armed forces
- Crew members on duty

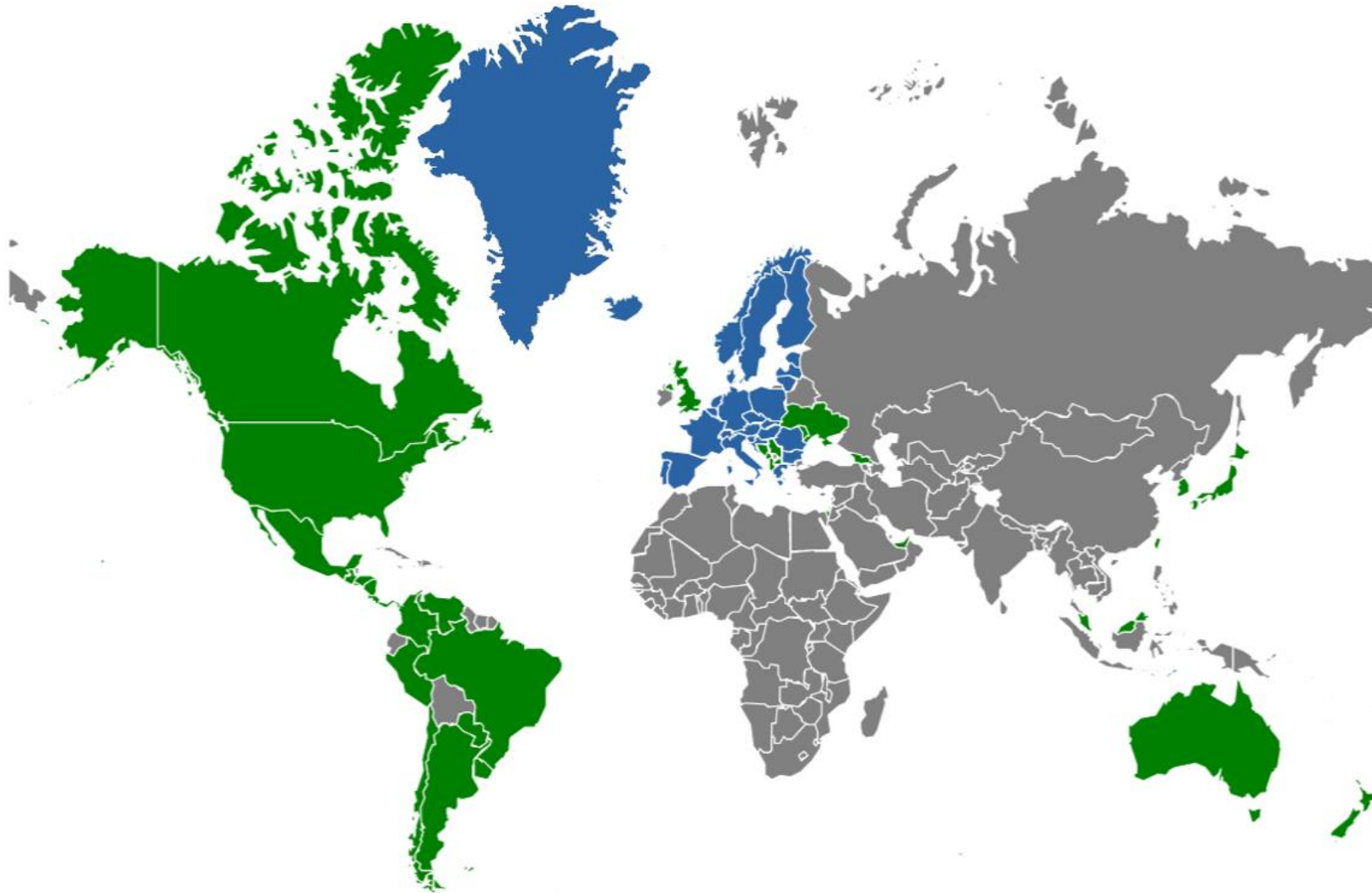


EUROPEAN COUNTRIES REQUIRING ETIAS

These 30 European countries require visa-exempt travellers to have an ETIAS travel authorisation:

Who should apply for an ETIAS ?



Blue: European countries where an ETIAS autorisation will be required from third country nationals

Green: Third countries whose citizens will need to be in possession of an ETIAS autorisation to travel to countries in blue.

(the map does NOT take into account recent visa liberalisation agreements).

ETIAS Benefits for the Authorities

Enhanced security, illegal immigration and public health risk assessment for visa-free travelers before arrival

01

More effective border checks and less refusals of entry at borders

02

Supports SIS alerts effectiveness

03

Improves prevention, detection and investigation of terrorist offences and serious criminal offences

04

Enables statistical analysis to identify trends, assess risks, and optimise strategic border management

05

ETIAS Benefits for the Applicants

Easy, secure, and affordable application without need for an interview in most cases

01

ETIAS authorisations granted within a few minutes for over 95% of travellers

02

Increased confidence to travellers in meeting entry requirements

03

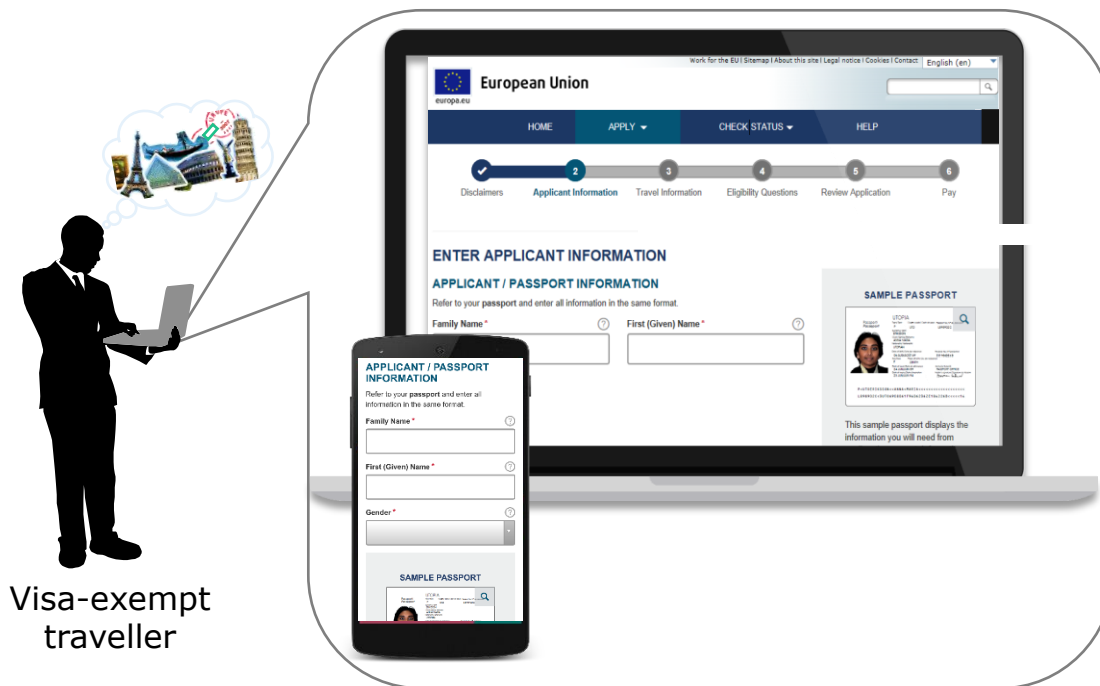
Facilitated border crossing and reduced wait times

04

Valid for multiple entries over 3 years, or until passport expires.
Stays of up to 90 days/180-day period

Valid for 3 years or until travel document expires

ETIAS Timeline



Transitional Period of at least 6 months -> no obligation for ETIAS

Grace period of at least 6 months: obligation for ETIAS but exception to first-time travelers
